Almost every day, I speak with someone who has recently moved to Tarrant County. They say things like, "all my family has moved here," "it's easier to afford a home," "there's so much to do." All true; Cowtown is booming.

But not for everyone. Stagnant wages and rising rents wreak havoc for families and especially single mothers. *One-third of single mothers with a child under age 5 are living in poverty; in some ZIP codes, as many as 72%.* Many become homeless.

As you know, such traumatizing situations place young children at risk for lower academic success and greater health problems – and services for these children are often limited.

But what if these women could turn to a place that was built with them in mind?

What if they could safely leave their babies and toddlers with a caretaker while they see a therapist, interview for a job, take a class or operate a small business?

What if children who have experienced poverty and trauma could have a space just for them that fosters learning, healthy development and emotional healing?


At Center for Transforming Lives, we are changing the landscape in Tarrant County for women with young children. Our Riverside Campus, set to open in fall 2024, will create a unique space to support, inspire and motivate mothers and their young children as they grow toward financial and emotional well-being. The spacious, park-like campus will provide a central location where women can enroll their children in early childhood education programs, get help finding housing, visit with a therapist and receive financial education.


Even the architecture is designed to create a sense of peacefulness for those who've experienced trauma, with features such as an interior garden, which will bring nature and light into the building.

To better serve women and children, Center for Transforming Lives is relocating AND expanding impact in southeast Fort Worth on South Riverside Drive.

Our new home will feature 14 acres and an impressive 65,000-square-foot multipurpose facility.

The campus is currently under construction and undergoing a transformation of its own – we envision a beautiful location where women with children can find comprehensive and healing pathways out of poverty.





Two-generation solutions will remain our priority, with a renewed commitment to accessibility. Here in ONE location on ONE day, mothers and children can access early childhood education, therapy, homeless services, and an entire hub of economic opportunity services, including a makerspace, commercial kitchen and business incubators that support mothers seeking primary or secondary sources of family income.



The need for housing services has never been greater - Tarrant County experienced a 27% rise in family homelessness during 2022 and has an eviction rate of nearly 10%.

Center for Transforming Lives works quickly to get families off the streets and out of shelters, into homes of their own. Case managers then work to build a cycle of emotional and financial stability for each family, using a trauma-informed, two-generation approach. Center for Transforming Lives offers both on-site and community-based housing, paired with comprehensive support:

# EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Education is the single most effective tool for breaking the generational hold of poverty – especially early childhood education (ECE).

However, only 58% of homeless children and 66% of all children entering Fort Worth ISD are kindergarten-ready.

Center for Transforming Lives provides affordable, yearround, literacy-rich education at four child development centers in addition to traditional child care. We also partner with other child care centers throughout Tarrant County to offer the following programming. Our **Early Head Start** program serves children newborn through 36 months providing literacyrich classrooms with low child-to-teacher ratios, individualized care, healthy daily meals, ample outdoortime and social strengthening

activities. Home visits are also provided to women from pregnancy through six weeks postpartum, offering education and support for a healthy pregnancy. Finally, group workshops are held providing pre- and post-natal resources and a sense of community.

Our **Head Start** program includes all the services offered in the Early Head Start program, with an increased focus on developing the social-emotional, cognitive, physical and language skills children need for a successful transition to kindergarten. Because young children need nurturing, low-stress environments filled with language, learning, physical activity and positive social interactions, all ECE classrooms are child-centered, with one-on-one attention and support for each child.



Center for Transforming Lives offers clinical counseling services dedicated to the emotional well-being of women, children and families. Our team of licensed therapists provides evidence-based, trauma-informed care through individual counseling and group therapy. This two-generational approach seeks to:

### Advocacy

We consider it a privilege to provide high-quality services to women and children to improve their lives. But we don't stop there. We influence and lead change in the community so that the next generation is not held back by ineffective policies and practices. During fiscal year 2023, we implemented a legislative agenda by providing expert testimony and public comment on state and federal policies that would ensure women achieve financial and emotional well-being.

### **Community Education**

Center for Transforming Lives launched a virtual Lunch and Learn webinar series in fiscal year 2023 to complement local and nationwide conference presentations. Internal leaders, staff, local and national thought leaders offer perspectives on research, advocacy and best practices in moving women and children out of poverty and creating generational cycles of well-being.

#### Research







#### Dr. Timothy and Sylvia Stevens

Dr. Stevens was drawn to medicine more than 60 years ago as a way to help people, and since his retirement, he and his wife Sylvia have opened an entirely new chapter by helping to empower people in their hometown community of Dallas-Fort Worth.

Dr. Stevens first became more active in the community via church outreach, serving as a chair on the Mission and Outreach Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth and using oil income from his South Texas family ranch to fuel philanthropic missions. While continuing to seek out locally-oriented nonprofits, he and his wife asked their financial advisor and CPA Jesse Booher for recommendations. Jesse told them about one of his favorite local outreach programs, Center for Transforming Lives.

The Stevens family immediately felt a passion for our mission of disrupting the cycle of poverty for women and children in the Dallas-Fort Worth community. They began donating time at annual events, and felt even more inspired hearing the testimonials of former clients and how Center for Transforming Lives equipped them with the skills and resources needed to find stability.

The couple has also been vocal about introducing others to our mission. According to Dr. Stevens, "I have an 'elevator talk' that I use to introduce people to Center for Transforming Lives. It consists of two questions. One: What is the main reason a man cannot get work? A lack of education. Two: What is the main reason a woman cannot get work? She has to take care of her children."
